HOCKEY NL ANNUAL REPORT



This past season was a very successful and busy one as we returned to a full schedule of programming. The registration report included illustrates a growth in participation numbers and we express gratitude to all the hundreds and thousands of volunteers at the local and league levels who contributed to this growth. We especially thank you, the leaders of your respective associations, leagues, teams, and communities. Your passion and compassion are so crucial to the success of the organization, and you and your volunteers are the backbone of our game.

As hockey fully returned at all divisions, we would like to acknowledge the volunteer time and dedication of our Board of Directors. Thank you to Directors, Gonzo Bennett, Gillian Sweeney, Ken Chafe, Derek Coffey, Ed Flood, Gary Gale, Tracey Hatcher, Charlie Kearsey, Jack Lee and Trevor Murphy.

Our four Council Executive Committees worked tirelessly through the hockey season to deliver programming and encourage the growth and development of the game in their respective divisions. Their contribution cannot go unnoticed and with the support of our staff, we were able to execute programs and services that align with our mission statement to Foster a Safe, Fun and Inclusive Hockey Experience.

A sincere gratitude to Garry Stamp, and Steele Hotels, for their continued partnership and support of hockey in the province.



Grow the Game

We continue to have an ad-hoc committee managed by Vice President, Trevor Murphy and Manager, Development and High Performance, Chad Brinson. We look to determine what the growth of the game means, in its broad definition and what areas we should focus on in the coming seasons. Some preliminary work has been completed in that determination, we have identified recruitment of young players at the early ages (5-7), broader programming for graduating Under 18 players, new para hockey programs and increase school hockey registration as priorities.

We have included some of our registration reports in the Hockey Canada registry in our annual report, and we see more than half of our minor hockey association numbers have grown since last hockey season.

We continue to be leaders in several national recruitment programs, and we would like to thank those that provided ice time and human resources to deliver Try Hockey, First Shift and Esso Fun Day Programs.

We had a one-year trial partnership with AO TV to broadcast all Atlantic regional championships as well as the Herder Memorial Senior A Championship. For the six minor Atlantic Championships there were over 13,586 views and for the 2023 Herder that competed in five games, we had over two thousand paid audience with an expected viewership of over five thousand across nine provinces. Really great to see the interest in our sport and provincial competition for the Herder, as we get our fans engaged across the province.

Organizational Development

We maintain importance in working on operations and governance efficiency. We hired a full time Coordinator, Accounting, in January 2023, Krista Gale. Krista and the new role have been an asset to the organization, as we work toward financial stability and efficiency through our strategic plan.

We established seven volunteers to conduct investigations on complaints of Maltreatment in our game. We had over 30 complaints that were directed back to Hockey NL via Independent Third Party for Hockey Canada. This continues to be a priority and challenging process that we review and modify regularly.

We have had a busy year in terms of our standing committee work, we sincerely thank all the members of the committees who gave up their time and provided their insight into agenda items that required attention.

We have a provincial organization gifting policy drafted and a new enhanced social media policy that will be implemented for the 2023-2024 season.

We also have a new detailed Life Membership Policy and are working on the final pieces of a crisis management policy and modernized risk management manual for the membership.

Program Consistency

We completed our first year of partnership with the Coaches Site. An interactive program website that we provided each association and high-performance coach with an annual subscription. Both the feedback and the activation rates were positive.



We delivered Coach Development weekends on five (5) sites last season. The program included both classroom and on ice sessions with coach education for divisions Under 7 to Under 15. We also paired this with some certification clinics, during the weekends. Participation numbers Goulds (10) Clarenville (10) Gander (10), Corner Brook (10), and St Pierre (17).

We always promote the Hockey Canada Pathways and look forward to the implementation of the pathways for U13 and U18 in the upcoming season.

We are ecstatic to be able to deliver a full High-Performance Program last year and look forward to the change in the female age grouping as we move forward. Our provincial teams represented the province proudly in the 2022 Atlantic Challenge Cup by winning one gold, one sliver, and one bronze in the four competitions.

We commissioned an external volunteer group to review and provide any suggestions and enhancements for our development program creations, oversight, and delivery. We were very pleased with the participation and results of the membership in surveys and look forward to the final work on details and the execution of the report for the membership.

To enhance participant development and retention at the game official level, Hockey NL adopted the Green Arm Band Program. This began halfway through the season when we provided Green Arm Bands for younger officials to bring awareness to the players, coaches and fans, that these are officials in the learning stages and treat them with respect.

We would like to congratulate all champions of last season's provincial championships and acknowledge the great work by the Paradise Minor Hockey Association in hosting the 2023 Under 13 Atlantic Championships.

The commitment in competing in the Don Johnson Cup Junior B Atlantic's remains a priority of the St. John's Junior Hockey League and its teams, and express appreciation to the league and teams on this sustainability.




FINANCE

HNL revenues are mainly sourced from registration fees for various programs, government funding, and sponsorships. HNL continues to focus on the management of all revenues and have numerous controls set in place. With the 2022-23 season being the first full season of uninterrupted operations since 2020, we maintained the fee structure and credited back to our members the reduction in fees from Hockey Canada.
